

We live in a nice section of the country. It is a great place to bring up children. It is a nice place to retire. People are friendly and the streets are safe. The economy is good.

Still, upon reflection, I think we would all agree that it is not much like heaven.

Our Town Has a Cemetery, but Heaven Does Not. There are no hillsides dotted with the markers of loved ones "across Jordan." You will not find silent cities of the dead in heaven, for no one ever dies there. John wrote, "There shall be no more death" (Revelation 21:4).

Our Town Has a Hospital, but Heaven Does Not. This time of year, hospitals are filled with the sick, but there will be not a single patient in heaven, for there are no sicknesses, diseases, or injuries there. Sickness and death came into the world because of sin, and all those ill effects are

reversed in heaven. John said, "The former things have passed away" (Revelation 21:4).

Our Town Has a Jail, but Heaven Does Not. We live in a wicked society. Every night the news tells us about those who were robbed, raped, assaulted, extorted, beaten, or killed the day before. We rush to fasten our windows, bolt our doors, and secure our homes.

Did you know that there will be no bad news in heaven? The doors on those mansions have no dead bolts, the windows have no locks, and there are no burglar alarms. "There shall by no means enter it anything that defiles, or causes an abomination or a lie, but only those who are written in the Lamb's Book of Life" (Revelation 21:27).

Our Town Has a Nursing Home, but Heaven Does Not. We daily see the aging process in our loved ones and ourselves.

Skin wrinkles, vision dims, strength fails, hearing goes, and energy wanes (Ecclesiastes 12:3–7). But in that land, there are no retirement homes and no nursing facilities. In heaven we will receive new, incorruptible bodies (2 Corinthians 5:1–6).

Our Town Has a Funeral Home, but Heaven Does Not. Hardly a week goes by without some sadness mixed with our blessings.

We face heartaches and sometimes heartbreaks far more frequently than would be our choice. We find ourselves visiting funeral homes to bid farewell to our loved ones.

But the Bible says, "God will wipe away every tear from their eyes; and there shall be no more death, neither sorrow, nor crying" (Revelation 21:4).

Our Town Has a Drug Store, but Heaven Does Not. Here we must deal with headaches, arthritis, and a million other pains. There are no drug stores in heaven. John wrote, "There shall be no more pain" (Revelation 21:4).

Our Town Has Security Lights, but Heaven Does Not. Most businesses and homeowners pay additional fees for streetlamps, but in heaven the glory of God illuminates it. "The Lamb is its light" (Revelation 21:23). "There shall be no night there" (Revelation 21:25), so there will be no streetlamps, no night-lights, no candles, no flashlights.

Our Town Has Bars, Adult Stores, Nightclubs, and Casinos, but Heaven Does Not. There are many places of temptation in our community. The devil and his workers have been busy (1 Peter 5:8), and their influence is seen all around. Oh, how we sometimes wish we could lay our armor aside and just rest from the constant battle of faith! (Ephesians 6:13–18).

That day is coming. In the land where we have staked a claim, the devil has no passport. In fact, he will have been cast down into the lake of fire by then (Rev-

elation 20:10). His helpers, too, whom John personifies as the beast and the false prophet, will be cast into that lake (19:20). There are no porn shops, beer stores, or casinos in heaven (cf. Proverbs 20:1; Matthew 5:28).

Don't you want to go to such a place? Have you made your reservations by being washed in Jesus' blood? His requirements for salvation are found in His gospel, including the following: learning about Him (John 6:44–45); believing in Him as God's Son (John 8:24); repenting of all sins for Him (Luke 13:3); confessing faith in His deity (Romans 10:9–10); and being baptized into Him (Acts 2:38; Mark 16:16). He then requires that we live faithfully unto death (Revelation 2:10).

One day His followers will be ushered into a place that is not really much like our town!





People often comment on how mean some children can be, but they rarely say how nice they can be. This story made

me cry the first two times I read it.

At a fund-raising dinner for a school for learning-disabled children, the father of a student delivered a speech that would never be forgotten by all that attended.

After extolling the school and its dedicated staff, he asked, "Everything God does is done with perfection. Yet my son Shay cannot learn things as other children do. He cannot understand things as other children do. Where is God's plan reflected in my son?"

The audience was completely still and silent. He continued: "I believe that when God brings a child like Shay into the world, an opportunity to realize the divine plan presents itself, and it comes in the way people treat that child."

He told the following story:

Shay and his father had walked past a park where some boys Shay knew were playing baseball. Shay asked, "Do you think they will let me play?" Shay's father knew that the boys would not want him on their team.

But the father understood that if his son were allowed to play, it would give him a much-needed sense of belonging. Shay's father approached one of the boys on the field and asked if Shay could play. The boy looked around for guidance from his teammates.

Getting none, he took matters into his own hands. He said, "We are losing by six runs, and the game is in the eighth inning. I guess he can be on our team, and he can bat in the ninth inning."

In the bottom of the eighth inning, Shay's team scored, but was still behind by three. At the top of the ninth, Shay put on a glove and played in the outfield. Although no hits came his way, he was ecstatic just to be on the field, grinning from ear to ear as his father waved from the stands.

In the bottom of the ninth inning, Shay's team scored again. With two outs and the bases loaded, the potential winning run was on base. Shay was scheduled for the next at-bat. Would the team let Shay bat and give away their chance to win? Surprisingly, Shay was given the bat.

Everyone knew that a hit was all but impossible because Shay did not even know how to hold the bat properly, much less connect with the ball. However, as Shay stepped up to the plate, the pitcher moved a few steps to lob the ball in softly, so Shay could make contact.

The first pitch came, and Shay swung clumsily and missed. The pitcher again came forward and tossed the ball softly toward Shay. Shay swung and hit a slow ground ball to the pitcher. The pitcher could easily have thrown the ball to the first baseman. Shay would have been out, and that would have ended the game. Instead, the pitcher threw it on a high arc to right field, far beyond the first baseman.

Everyone started yelling, "Shay, run to first, run to first." Never in his life had Shay made it to base. He scampered down the baseline, wide-eyed and startled. Everyone yelled, "Run to second!"

By the time Shay rounded first base, the right fielder had the ball. He could have thrown to second base for a tag but he understood the pitcher's intentions, so he threw it high and far over the third baseman's head. Shay ran toward second

as the runners ahead of him deliriously circled the bases toward home.

As Shay reached second base, the opposing shortstop ran to him, turned him in the direction of third base, and shouted, "Run to third!" As Shay rounded third, the boys from both teams were screaming, "Shay! Run home!" As he stepped on home plate, he was cheered as the hero for hitting a "grand slam" and winning the game.

"That day," said the father softly with tears rolling down his face, "the boys from both teams helped bring a piece of the divine plan into this world."



Just for Fun The Fruit of the Spirit





In Psalm 8, David extols the glory of Jehovah, and marvels that God has been so mindful of man as to place the creation under his dominion. The context stresses man's responsibility over the earth.

In discussing some of earth's creatures of which man is in charge, the writer mentions "whatever passes along the paths of the seas" (8:8). This is interesting because the phrase contains a precise fact about the seas that David, whose experience was limited to a tiny country on the Mediterranean coast, could never have known from firsthand information.

It was not until the mid-nineteenth century that the discovery was made re-

garding currents (paths) in the sea. In 1860, a pioneer in oceanography named Matthew Fontaine Maury suggested that the ocean was a circulating system. His book on physical oceanography is still highly regarded on this science.

Consider, for example, the Gulf Stream. The Gulf Stream flows from the east coast of North America toward Europe. It is about 50 miles wide and 3,000 feet deep. Its rate of flow, measured in volume per second, is about 1,000 times greater than the Mississippi River. At some places, it moves at almost 140 miles per hour. Many ocean vessels "ride" this current to save shipping time and fuel.

In his book, *Matthew Fontaine Maury:* Pathfinder of the Seas (1927), Charles L. Lewis recorded how this discovery came about. When Maury was ill and confined to bed, his son read Psalm 8 to him. When he heard "paths of the sea," Maury declared, "If God said there are paths in the sea, I will find them."

The rest is history. A monument was erected in Richmond, Virginia, as a tribute to Maury. In part it reads as follows: "Matthew Fontaine Maury, Pathfinder of the seas, the genius who first snatched from the ocean and atmosphere the secret of their laws."

TYPES ANTITYPES

BRONZE SERPENT as a type of **CHRIST**

Read Numbers 21 -

God is amazing. No one else could put the shadow of future things into the past. Types and antitypes are an example of God prefiguring the future. Types are the shadow in the Old Testament of things that were to come (antitypes) in the **New Testament.**

An example of this is seen in comparing the Bronze Serpent from Numbers 21:8-9 to Christ (John 3:14).



THE SERPENT

Their sin had separated them from God (PSALM 106:13).

Punishment for sin was death (NUMBERS 21:6).

Grace was extended (NUMBERS 21:8).

The remedy was raised on a pole (NUMBERS 21:9).

There was only one remedy for their sin (NUMBERS 21:9).

Faith was required to look upon the snake (NUMBERS 21:9).

Did you receive a subscription invitation to the Social Register this year? No? Not to worry. Truth be told, there is another book that is far more important: the Lamb's Book of Life (Philippians 4:3; Revelation 21:27).

It is fine to be honored on earth for prominence or importance, but the bigger question is whether or not our names are written in God's book in heaven. Jesus asked, "What profit is it to a man if he gains the whole world, and loses his own soul? Or what will a man give in exchange for his soul?" (Matthew 16:26).

Entrance into New Jerusalem will be only for those whose names are found in God's book. John foresaw the scene: "I saw the dead, small and great, standing before God, and books were opened. And another book was opened, which is the Book of Life. And the dead were judged according to their works, by the things that were written in the books" (Revelation 20:12).

The applause of prominence on earth will one day be drowned out by the applause of heaven: "Then each one's praise will come from God" (1 Corinthians 4:5).
