
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There used to be a website that posted information for those who were looking for lost family Bibles. A typical entry was like this.

LANCASTER

Last known place that the Bible was at in the late 1920s to early '30s Wysox, Pennsylvania. This Bible had the family history in it.

Others were more poignant:

VALENTE

I'm looking for a Bible belonging to Joseph Valente. Joseph passed away in 1998 and his Mom sent the Bible to Joe's brother Danny in North Carolina. Danny never received the Bible, and we can't find it. The Bible has sentimental value, as Joe is no longer with us. Any info would be wonderful.

Have you ever lost a Bible? You may have put it on top of your car as you talked to a friend in the church parking lot and forgot to get it before driving home. You may have misplaced it in a move or loaned it to a friend who never returned it. Most of us have lost a Bible before—at least for a few days.

Have you lost a Bible in church? Many Bibles turn up on church lost and found tables. Of all places to lose a Bible, church seems the least likely. We expect to *use* our Bibles in worship—not misplace them. We expect to *find* truth in church—not lose it.

In the days of Josiah, the Jews found God's law that had been lost. Hilkiah the high priest told Shaphan the scribe, "I have found the Book of the Law in the house of the LORD" (2 Kings 22:8). This led to a revival among God's people.

Let's take this idea of "losing the Bible" in church and explore it from different perspectives. Some Christians "lose the Bible." How?

SOME LOSE THE BIBLE IN MODERNISM

Modernism denies the supernatural. England, who gave the world the King James Version in the seventeenth century, lost the Bible in the nineteenth century. They still had copies of Scripture; they just did not believe it anymore. Today many reject the truth that the Bible is an inspired revelation from God (cf. 2 Timothy 3:16–17; 2 Peter 1:20–21).

Religious liberalism plagues today's world. Many religious seminary professors do not believe in full inspiration, the virgin birth, the bodily resurrection of Jesus, nor the miracles the Bible records that Jesus did (cf. John 20:30–31). Religious groups led by people trained at these institutions cannot expect their faith to grow.

SOME LOSE THE BIBLE IN POLITICS

France lost the Bible leading up to the French Revolution in 1789. Before the Revolution, France spent millions of dollars indoctrinating their people with atheistic literature. They felt the Bible stood in the way of progress, so they tried to remove it. When they did, they lost their government. The people gained freedom from religion and rebelled against the state.

A similar thing is currently underway in America and other nations. Many people no longer read the Bible; some openly defy it.1 Governments have distanced themselves from it while opening the doors to secularism and false religions such as Islam. As unbelief in Scripture gains ground, morality plunges. Hate runs rampant; fornication is widely practiced; divorces are common; homosexuality is accepted; abortion is defended; dishonesty, stealing, drug use, gambling, and practically every form of unethical behavior is seen on every street corner, TV show, and news report.

SOME LOSE THE BIBLE IN THE PULPIT

There are churches that get only a thimbleful of the water of life in a whole Sunday service. I am studying the Bible with a man who previously attended a denomination. He loves the church of Christ because we teach the Bible. He said his previous "pastor" vaguely referred to a verse at the beginning of a sermon, and that was it for the whole hour.

Congregations that hear little but personal interest stories, testimonials, pop psychology, current religious thought, jokes, commentary on contemporary events, and men's opinions are spiritually starving (cf. 2 Timothy 4:2). Franklin Camp said, "[A] sermon without scripture is like an empty bucket for one dying of thirst." How can people learn the Bible if they do not hear it? (Romans 10:14). Abraham spoke from Paradise to say, "They have Moses and the prophets; *let them hear them*" (Luke 16:29).

SOME LOSE THE BIBLE BY ABSENTEEISM

Many grew up attending Bible classes, worshiping, and reading the Bible at home, but somewhere in college or in the busy years of their twenties, they grew lax and quit attending services. God wants each one back. He accepts prodigals every week. He rejoices when the new generations of children grow up with a knowledge of God (cf. 2 Peter 2:20–22).

SOME LOSE THE BIBLE IN NEGLECT

A small child took a Bible from a coffee table and asked, "Mother, is this God's book?"

"Yes, it surely is," she replied.

"Well, I think we had better send it back to Him, because we don't use it anymore."

Satan does not care if we own ten Bibles so long as we do not read any of them. On a Bible quiz, one group thought an epistle was the wife of an apostle, the tower of Babel was the place where Solomon kept his wives, and the Mosaic Law was a law compelling people to have their floors laid with colored stones.

It may seem simplistic in this tech age to encourage such a basic thing as reading a book, but Bible reading is fundamental to spiritual life. John said, "Blessed is he who reads" (Revelation 1:3). Paul said, "Till I come, give attention to reading, to exhortation, to doctrine" (1 Timothy 4:13).

God commanded every king of Israel to read the Scriptures: "It shall be with him, and he shall read it all the days of his life, that he may learn to fear the LORD his God and be careful to observe all the words of this law and these statutes" (Deuteronomy 17:19).

Caleb Thomas Winchester once said that the great books are those "that everybody wants to have read and nobody wants to read."² No one should go to the grave without having read the Bible. The Bible is the greatest book; it deserves the most attention. Find your Bible and read it!

Barriers to Submission

First Corinthians 11:7 says the "woman is the glory of man." Proverbs 18:22 says, "He who finds a wife finds a good thing." A godly spouse brings great benefit to a family, cultivating a peaceful home, stronger marriage, and spiritual growth (1 Peter 3:1–4). Here are some barriers to being a godly wife:

- Vying for power and control of the family.
- Not supporting her godly husband's decisions.
- Desire for independence. (Husbands and wives are to depend on each other.)
- Open or passive opposition to God's command to husbands to be leaders and providers (Ephesians 5:23–33; 1 Timothy 5:8).

God said, "It is not good that man should be alone; I will make him a helper comparable to him" (Genesis 2:18). The wife is as important as the husband; he must honor her (1 Peter 3:7). Let us be thankful for the women in our lives. What would we do without them?

On a recent trip, my wife and I stayed in a hotel. I noticed a label on the TV remote: "This will not work in the home."

I thought of other things that will not work in the home.

- Selfishness—A family cannot work based on "Big me, little you." Marriage and parenting both require sacrifice and love (1 Corinthians 7:4; Ephesians 5:25; 6:1–4).
- Dishonesty—Honesty is not the best policy; it is the only policy. Many families are unstable because they are dishonest with each other. An extramarital affair divides a home. Jesus said, "Every city or house divided against itself will not stand" (Matthew 12:25).
- **Rebellion**—Rebels displease God (1 Samuel 15:22). A rebellious home is neither happy nor functional. Children who respect parents have far fewer problems than rebels (Ephesians 6:2–3).
- **Permissiveness**—Children often rule the roost. Parents back away from firm

rules and discipline because they fear they will damage their children's selfesteem. Children need discipline in order to become mature adults. The Bible still says, "He who spares his rod hates his son, but he who loves him disciplines him promptly" (Proverbs 13:24).

• Secularization—In times past, parents feared God, read the Bible, and followed morality in the home. There was a healthy fear of eternal punishment. These days, however, the perpetual influence of television brings a postmodern philosophy of "anything goes" and "people do not matter much." Grappling with issues of right and wrong does not occur in some homes, because, according to many, right and wrong no longer exist.

Like the hotel TV remote, these things will not work in the home. —Lance Cordle

Let us not forget the reason the Bible was written and preserved: "that you may know that you have eternal life" (1 John 5:13).

Christ is the center, focus, and key to the inspiration and interpretation of the Bible. This is why the books of the Old and New Testaments fit together so well into one cohesive and comprehensive whole. Taken together, they present the progressive unfolding, revelation, and communication of Christ.

- 1. The Law (Genesis–Deuteronomy) prepares the ground or base on which the moral system of Christ rests. It is the beginning or first principles of the system of truth. Christ is the ultimate foundation of all that is right (1 Corinthians 3:11).
- 2. The History section (Joshua–Esther) shows the preparation for Christ. History, from an inerrant biblical perspective, holds true the necessity of righteousness and faith (2 Timothy 3:16).

3. Poetry (Job–Song of Solomon) expresses an aspiration for Christ the Savior.

Seeing that Scripture is nothing less than the words of our very Creator, it is no wonder that throughout the centuries men and women have been astonished by it. David said, "The law of the LORD is perfect" (Psalm 19:7).

Center, Focus,

- 4. Prophecy (Isaiah–Malachi) proclaims an expectation of Christ. The Bible is the account of redemption, how God rescues men from sin and from death.
- 5. The Gospel Records (Matthew-John) relate the historical manifestation of Christ. They are true accounts of the work and the acts of Christ the Son of God (John 20:30–31).
- 6. Acts relates the propagation of the gospel of Christ. It portrays the resurrected Christ in His ascension, by

the Spirit, through the disciples, for the producing of the church—the kingdom of God.

- 7. The Epistles (Romans–Jude) give the interpretation of Christ. The epistles answer questions asked by the church or address problems within the church.

The Four Thieves of the Crucifixion



(1) The thief who regretted (John 12:6). Oh, the advantages Judas had! Jesus selected him to be an apostle, and his peers trusted him as the treasurer. He observed many of Jesus' sermons and miracles (Matthew 11:5). Yet it was Judas who betrayed Christ for money. His betrayal turned to regret, but rather than seeking forgiveness, he hanged himself (Matthew 27:3–5). Repentance means more than feeling sorry for a wrong. It is the desire to change and do better (2 Corinthians 7:10).

(2) The thief who was replaced. It was customary to release a prisoner at the Passover. Thus, Pilate offered the crowd either Jesus or Barabbas. They requested the notorious murderer and robber rather than Jesus (Matthew 27:15–16; John 18:40). Barabbas had someone else (Jesus) take his punishment for him. Barabbas could say that Jesus died in his place. Of course, we can say it, too (2 Corinthians 5:20–21).

(3) The thief who rebelled. At first both thieves crucified spoke against Christ (Matthew 27:41–44), but only one kept on doing it (Luke 23:39). This thief remained impenitent because he forgot God, ignored death at hand, and justly deserved what he was receiving (Luke 23:40–41). He died in a state of rebellion in spite of the rebuke and repentance of the other thief and a Savior close at hand.

(4) The thief who repented. This thief had a change of heart. In his agony, he looked to the Savior and admitted his sinfulness and Jesus' innocence (Luke 23:40–42). His repentance did not bring escape from death, but it did bring relief and fellowship with Jesus in the next life (v. 43). He did what the Lord wanted him to do, and in that sense he is an example to us.

All of us are represented by one of these thieves. Have you let Jesus down? Have you allowed Jesus to take your place? Are you rebellious? Have you repented? Which are you? —Gary Puryear

Tell the Devil Off

James A. Garfield stated, "If there be one thing upon the earth that mankind loves and admires better than another, it is a brave man—a man who dares look the devil in the face and tell him he is the devil."¹ A Christian can do that. He has the armor of God (Ephesians 6:10–20). He has the assurance that John gave: "You are of God, little children, and have overcome them, because He who is in you is greater than he who is in the world" (1 John 4:4).

The Devil's Darts

Paul spoke of "taking the shield of faith with which you will be able to quench all the fiery darts of the wicked one" (Ephesians 6:16). The devil is powerful (1 Peter 5:8). We should be aware of his strategies (2 Corinthians 2:11). Consider some of the devil's darts.

The dart of doubt. If the devil can create disbelief in the existence of God, His supernatural power, or the inspiration and truthfulness of the Bible, he has rendered that person ineffective. The promises of God do not challenge the doubter because he is not convinced that they will be fulfilled. Warnings concerning the punishment of sin do not motivate.

The dart of deception. Satan is a master hypocrite. He appears to be an angel of light (2 Corinthians 11:13–15). His charming appearance is simply sheep's clothing disguising the wolf underneath (Matthew 7:15). His teaching is deceptive. He has contradicting doctrines to please anyone who will listen.

The dart of discouragement. The devil tempts one to reflect on past failures, other's unfaithfulness, or incapability. When we are faithful to God, we may be down, but never out (1 Corinthians 15:57).

The dart of delay. The devil always says, "Tomorrow will be better." However, God says, "Behold, now is the accepted time; behold, now is the day of salvation" (2 Corinthians 6:2). —Jerrie Barber



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
